Jo Stratton Multiple Sclerosis Research



Jo began studying in Melbourne in 2006 after growing up in Vancouver, Canada. While living in Vancouver she enjoyed the beautiful scenery and wilderness; but also focused on furthering her Undergraduate Degree in Science. Science has always been a great interest. She said, "I have always questioned the way things work, enjoyed learning about the biology of human systems and I get excited knowing that there is still a vast unknown world of physiology left to discover." Jo's father was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis (MS) in 1996. Her passion for MS research stemmed from this personal experience of the disease. Being awarded 2 Funding Scholarships to do her PhD in MS research is a great achievement. Jo said she is "looking forward to all the challenges and experiences that are to come". Jo aims to understand how new cells called oligodendrocytes are regenerated in the brain after oligodendrocyte death. Understanding which genes control regeneration of oligodendrocytes could translate into developing new strategies to treat Multiple Sclerosis and prevent long-term disability.

While cleaning their hands and informing us on the importance of cleanliness when handling snakes, Paul and Tammy asked if any of us were scared of snakes..... "Not much!" said this little editor. The first snake Tammy showed us was an 'Albino Darwin Carpet Python'. As it wound round her arm she let, those who were game touch it. IPP Michele

had never done that before and she was quite impressed. Alysia as this python likes to be known is 8 months old and will get to about 8 ft long at about five years old and cost around \$2,500.

Then Paul brought out the Stimson's Python. It was fully grown and worth about \$400. Again they let everyone touch it while they talked about it. It was interesting to hear that reptiles are now more popular than cats; dog; rabbits and guineapigs. Cats, dogs etc are on their way out and snakes, frogs, lizards and reptiles are on the way in.

The Tanami Woma was next—this was a big snake. The woma is 3 yrs old, fully grown and Paul wasn't quite so keen to let us touch this one 'cos it had not been fed and it was a little angry. Bred rats imported from Queensland seems to be the stable diet of the Woma. As explained by Paul the Womas range in size, colour and pattern. Didn't get the price of this one.

To be able to sell snakes you need to have a special trade permit. Paul and Tammy went through some quite stringent tests to get their permit. After this weeks speakers we now have a much better understanding of snakes, we know they are fed once a fortnight in winter when they are hibernating. A rat can do a lot of damage to a snake.

Finally Vin gave the vote of thanks, and while he found it very interesting he is still not quite sure or convinced he wants to buy a snake.
